






Ministerial Joint Statement between Japan and CARICOM


The Foreign Minister also indicated that <u>Japan will</u> <u>continue to extend its cooperation</u> towards overcoming such vulnerabilities particular to CARICOM Member States utilizing Japanese technologies and expertise nurtured through its similar experience <u>in the fields of disaster risk</u> reduction, countermeasures against environmental degradation, climate change, energy, waste management and fisheries amongst others.



What is CARIFICO?

- The Caribbean Fisheries Co-management Project (CARIFICO) is a joint collaboration between Caribbean Regional Fisheries Mechanism (CRFM) member countries, CRFM Secretariat, and JICA.
- Project was initiated on 1st of May, 2013 with 5 years period.
- The project purpose is to establish real examples of fisheries co-management.
- FADs are selected for the pilot activities .
- The pilot activities are carried out 6 eastern Caribbean countries where FADs are used and the outputs of the pilot activities will be disseminated across the Caribbean region.

Why FAD for Co-management project?



Expected Outputs


 ✓ Consensus building on fishing rules around FADs and their maintenance

- ✓ Cost sharing for maintenance and replacement of the FADs
- ✓ Recording and reporting the logbook

Activities for Fisheries co-management

- -Fisher Registration and issuing ID card
- -Collection of Catch and Effort data with log book
- -Development of Reliable Fisheries Statistics
- -Stock assessment and evaluation
- -Formulation of Fishing Management Plan
- -Updating Fisheries Act and Regulations
- -Strengthening of Law enforcement








Japanese Experiences
